

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ENGAGEMENT FINDINGS

Introduction

Earlier this year, Margaret Sullivan Studio, SP+A, Halvorson Design, and Tighe & Bond assisted with conducting a feasibility study for the location of the Russell Library.

Based on extensive community input, the Russell Library/ City Hall Feasibility Study Committee determined that there is strong support for keeping the library at its existing downtown location. The committee voted to redesign the library on its current site, preserving the historic church while constructing a new expanded facility. This decision reflects a commitment to integrating contemporary library services and design with Middletown's rich history.

This document summarizes key findings from the community engagement process and serves as a guide and framework for future planning, programming, and design.


Engagement Methods






An average 15 % of respondents have population under 18 years old in their households

By addressing these challenges and enhancing what the community values, we can better plan for the future needs of the Middletown community, making the library more engaging and enjoyable for everyone.

The historical building and downtown location provide a unique and central gathering space for the community.

The engaging children's programs and services opportunities for young learners.

Community events and programs that foster connection and engagement among residents.

Friendly and helpful staff that make community members want to come to the library again and again.

Books with various selections/formats for the diverse interest of their community members.

Access to materials, resources, and technology support to assist all levels of learners.

Resources and services to support workforce development.

What are the barriers to enjoying the library?

The building is not accessible or easy to navigate.

It lacks flexibility, convenience, and affordable parking.

People don't know about the benefits and programs the library offers.

There is a limitation in the operational hours.

There is a perception that certain groups may not feel fully represented.

Lack of community gathering space in the library.

Lingering covid concerns deter community members.

There is no space that allows for noise or has a more vibrant atmosphere.

There is no designated space for coworking.

There is a lack of safety due to the building layout.


The current space feels unwelcoming and lacks a sense of support due to the outdated building.

Library Location

The consensus among community members is a strong desire for the library to remain downtown.

This preference arises from the downtown's pedestrian-friendly environment, economic vitality, and accessibility for a diverse range of residents. Serving as a vibrant hub for youth and family gatherings, downtown features an array of boutique shops, diverse eateries, parks, and recreational areas. Community organizations thrive here, hosting events that foster connection and civic engagement.

The library, as a cornerstone of this community, provides essential resources and programs, creating a welcoming space for all ages. Community members have expressed deep affection for the library's historical building, underscoring its significance as a cherished landmark that fosters connection and a sense of belonging.



Community Aspirations

The community values the library greatly and trusts the library leadership to further improve library services for all. Community members noted there are opportunities for the library to be a stronger connector to resources through partnerships.

The community has a strong passion for supporting one another and advocating to promote equity throughout the city. Community members see the library as a vehicle for fostering community gathering and casual socialization that can encourage people to connect, share experiences, and engage with one another.

Community Aspirations

The following are community-wide aspirations identified by participants as having the potential for deep impact and fostering a thriving Middletown for all. While these goals extend beyond the library's direct role, there are meaningful opportunities for the library to serve as a connector and supporter alongside other local organizations.

A Space To Commune, Connect, & Grow Together

There is significant excitement about creating a space that **actively combats post-COVID loneliness** by fostering meaningful community connections through **creating inviting comfortable spaces.**

Accessible, Diverse Programming To Provide Enriching Memories

Residents are eagerly **seeking diverse programming opportunities;** such as author events, concerts, plays, film screenings, arts programs, community gardens, and volunteer activities. These programs should be **consistently scheduled** to engage the varied interests of community members and **make enriching experiences and lifelong memories more accessible.**

Preparedness For Times Of Uncertainty

Residents are interested in establishing as a public resource that services during emergencies, offering shelters, charging stations, or showers to support the community during unprecedent times like natural disasters. Specifically, expanding services through 24-hour pop-up facilities like kitchens or cafe, to accommodate emergency situations better.

Stronger Partnerships For A Connected Future

The most resounding excitement is around coalition building and strengthening partnerships to proactively respond to local needs, such as educational support and referrals to familial and social services. This collaboration with non-profits, city institutions, and educational entities aims to foster prosperity and improve the quality of life for all.

Accessible, Safe Services For Everyone

Residents are seeking accessible services and spaces that ensure everyone can fully engage in a diverse array of opportunities. Barriers such as unclear signage, restrictive hours, or mobility issues can be addressed by creating inclusive outreach service models that bring resources and safe spaces to those facing various challenges.

Balancing Innovative & Traditional Collections

Residents are excited for the opportunity to explore **new technology**, enjoy continued access to **basic collection needs** (e.g., print media, subscription media), and have **innovative resources** in their community that support their personal interests, creative explorations, and economic development.

Empowering Youth Through Diverse and Inclusive Programming

Residents are especially excited about the enhanced **youth offerings and intergenerational experiences** in the new library. They anticipate innovative ways to **connect with youth, support families, and promote life-long learning, career development, and play.**

Economic Connector & Catalyst

Residents are excited for the library to be a connector to foster community coalitions and collaborations among individuals, organizations, and local businesses, while also offering resources and services to support community workforce development.

Programmatic Opportunities

The community has expressed a desire for more programming and services, including intergenerational or concurrent youth and adult program opportunities. While **Russell Library already offers a wide range of programs**, many residents are unaware of them. Additionally, **the current building limits the ability to expand these programs and introduce new offerings** that community members are asking for.

There is a strong community interest in programming that celebrates Middletown's history and natural beauty; including outdoor film series, historical programs, and a community sketchbook. Residents also expressed a desire for more arts, digital, and educational programs.



Future Planning and Activations



- Design ADA-accessible and safe spaces.
- Increase restrooms throughout the library.
- Install clear signage throughout the library.
- Provide free parking or a shuttle service to the library.
- Create communal and social gathering spaces.
- Support and honor the historical and natural setting of the existing building.

Programming & Activation

- Strengthen community partnerships.
- Create a community map to identify partnership opportunities.
- Offer more constant programming and services.
- Develop concurrent adult and youth programming and intergenerational spaces.
- Explore the possibility of establishing a library branch or outreach program near schools and in outlying neighborhoods.
- Galvanize volunteer opportunities to support creative programming.
